
SHORT INTRODUCTION: FAKE NEWS

DEBATE FORMAT AND RULES

- A debate team will have ± 4 students each with their own task.
- There will be three different statements.
- Each statement has a proposition and an opposition debate team
- Every speaker has 4 minutes to speak.

General rules;

- The jury will look at presentation and argumentation.
- You are allowed to use a POI (Point of information) **after** the first minute of a speech.
- What can you ask in a point of information?

You can ask for a clarification of the argument or question the facts and ask for a source.



THE STATEMENTS

1) Social Media Platforms Should Be Legally Responsible for Moderating and Removing Fake News.

2) People who repeatedly, both purposefully or accidentally, spread false information to deceive others should be subject to increasing legal penalties based on the harm caused.

3) Unrestricted freedom of speech cannot coexist with protecting democracy from fake news and disinformation.




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
